Achievements

Greetings!

Well, we've ended another year of challenges and successes, much like last year. Although we haven't quite been able to return to "business as usual," we adapted to the increased and then relaxed restrictions of the pandemic, which has put every business and citizen, including VAIL and our staff, to the test. I am proud to say that even though it has been difficult and, at times, exhausting, VAIL continues to thrive during this period of unprecedented change.

Thankfully, once again, we had an amazing Arctic Dip! Even though the event had to be modified to account for COVID restrictions, our participants and sponsors remained enthusiastic and generous! We also participated again in Great Community Give, sponsored by The Community Foundation of Harrisonburg & Rockingham County, which was also a success! We remain forever grateful to our community and those who give of their time, talents, and donations to help VAIL thrive!

In addition to fundraising, we wrote numerous grants to provide funding for upgrades to technology, which became so very important during this period of "virtual" rather than face-to-face connections. The upgrades also allow staff to work remotely as efficiently and effectively as they are able to work in our office.

VAIL was also able to continue to deliver multiple services. We provided for 15 home modifications, which ensured the residents could remain at home safely and visit safely with their family and friends outside. During this time of isolation, the ability to connect in this way is incredibly important. Additionally, we provided one-on-one independent living supports for isolated individuals, allowing them to continue with their day-to-day routines and also safely interact with peers in social settings.

VAIL continued to support families and individuals with PPE as necessary. We ran virtual trainings to increase knowledge and encourage self-care. We continued to respond to Information and Referral requests and helped individuals navigate the already-confusing and intricate systems of Independent Living, made more confusing by the pandemic. VAIL staff has continued to adapt and grow during a time of change and difficulty.

While we hope that things will be back to normal soon, in the interim, VAIL will continue to do the good and necessary work we do within our new normal! We remain grateful for our consumers, our community, our supporters, and our staff and we look forward to this new season and 2022!







Survey Results

An annual survey was sent to all current recipients of VAIL's services to ensure VAIL is providing quality services that meet the needs of individuals with disabilities in our community.

When asked which type of service received from VAIL was the most helpful, the top 4 responses were:

- ⇒ They helped me use personal care, respite, or companion care so I could stay in my home
- ⇒ They put me in touch with other agencies or people who could help me
- ⇒ They helped me make my own choices
- ⇒ They helped me understand my social security and other benefits

"I would refer any friend of mine to VAIL if they needed help for themselves or family members who needed help with independency since they have been so helpful to me." 100% of respondents stated
that VAIL staff stayed in
contact with them, treated
them with respect, & are
well-informed.

Survey recipients were asked to identify the 5 biggest needs of people with disabilities in our area. The top five responses were:

Need	% Response
Transportation	56%
Affordable Housing	46%
Accessible Housing	31%
Personal Assistance Care-Funding	31%
Respite Care	31%

VAIL responded to every COVID-related need identified. Examples include securing groceries for individuals, assisting people in home modifications through the rental unit accessibility modifications (RUAM) process, assisting people through the Dominion Energy Share program, and purchasing and shipping

face masks, gloves, hand sanitizer, and disinfectant.

Respondents said that throughout the pandemic VAIL provided them with support.
